THE ELD MANDATE, AND WHAT IT MEANS FOR YOU

The ELD Mandate is Federal regulation that requires drivers and fleets operating in the U.S. to use an ELD when recording a driver's log.

Most of the regulation provides details for how the devices will function and how drivers, fleets, and law enforcement will use them.

QUICK FACTS

- Hours of Service regulations haven't changed, but how drive-time is recorded and reported has.
- The ELD mandate created an industry standard to prevent errors, logbook tampering, and driver harassment.
- When the mandate first went into effect, paper logs were required to be replaced with a compliant device that connects directly to the engine control module.
- Drivers who are exempt from Hours of Service or Record of Duty Status will not be required to use an ELD.

ARE YOU EXEMPT FROM THE ELD MANDATE?

While some exemptions have been added or modified since 2015, these three have persisted: Non-CDL Short Haul Operators, Driveaway-Towaway Operators, and engines that were manufactured before the year 2000. For more exceptions visit the FMCSA website.

A NON-CDL SHORT HAUL OPERATOR:

- Drives a truck that doesn't require a CDL
- Works within a 150 air-mile radius of a usual work-reporting location and returns there each day
- Follows the 10-hour off duty and 11-hour driving requirements
- Doesn't drive after the 14th hour after coming on duty on five days of any period of seven consecutive days
- Doesn't drive after the 16th hour after coming on duty on two days of any period of seven consecutive days

A DRIVEAWAY-TOWAWAY OPERATOR:

 Drives any vehicle or recreation vehicle trailer that constitutes the commodity being transported.

COUNTDOWN TO COMPLIANCE







The ELD Mandate passed on December 16, 2015 and required fleets and drivers to switch from paper-based logging to a compliant ELD solution within two years. Fleets and drivers who had installed AOBRDs before the mandate passed were given two additional years to transition to fully-compliant ELD solutions – this is known as the grandfather clause.

As of December 16, 2019, grandfathered AOBRD devices – and ELDs running in AOBRD mode – will no longer be accepted by law enforcement.

WHAT TO EXPECT WHEN TRANSITIONING TO ELECTRONIC LOGGING DEVICES

How the final stage of the ELD mandate will affect your operations

FIVE CHANGES TO ANTICIPATE

- DRIVER LOGBOOKS Drivers will be able to edit their logs with required notes and must approve their logbooks daily. Fleet managers will not be able to edit a driver log without the driver's approval.
 - DATA SHARING Data must be easily and securely shared with law enforcement in a standardized format to save time and reduce confusion.
 - DATA COLLECTION Devices will collect additional data including engine power status, vehicle motion status, vehicle location, engine hours, miles driven, driver CDL number, and vehicle identification number.
 - DRIVER ALERTS Devices will be required to trigger an alert when there is "unassigned driving time", or when a device malfunctions.
- DRIVER DUTY STATUS All vehicle drive time must include a duty status. Duty Statuses mandated by the U.S. include: On-Duty, Off-Duty, Driving, and Sleeper Berth. Additionally, fleet managers can give drivers the option of logging time spent on Yard Moves or Personal Conveyance as driving events.
